Notes

The form is primarily a local 1st century AD NE Essex form. At Sheepen there were at least 37 examples, large and small, some of which would be bowls, not jars (there are comparable bowls from Lexden and Kelvedon, both NE Essex, in D'2-1). The examples in the type trays are of good native grog; their contexts are I-III/IV, i.e. AD 10-61. The Braintree ones are Roman, and mid 1st century AD at least. The Prae Wood example is similar, and also in a late context; the Braughing ones are simpler and coarser, and like Faversham are earlier variants of the B3 form.
