Notes

These are small and have the same square proportions as some of the El-1 cups, but because they have more than one cordon they have no waist constriction. They occur widely, but even across the Chilterns are never large, although red ones are more common there. Datable contexts so far are 1st century AD, and occasionally overlapping the conquest (as at Shenfield); Sheepen shows the range. There are quite a lot in the Sheepen type trays, all with two cordons and no constriction, grog-tempered but thin and smooth, often burnished, but never very romanised. Cam.213 shows the slacker late version, post-conquest, but only five definite specimens were counted.

It occurs in local fabrics occasionally (greensand in Kent, Zone 9 sandy ware at Great Chesterford and Cambridge).

The Colchester Cemetery vessel is close to El-4.
