Notes

There is no indication of a 1st century BC date for this form, and most of the Sheepen examples are in thin romanising ware and sometimes with the flattened angular shoulder that is a romanising tendency. Cam.233 is illustrated by an example from 'Dunmow'. The Lexden and Chad well Heath pots are Roman, although the latter is grog-tempered. The others are apparently AD 10-43.
