

G3-3: COPIES OF GALLO-BELGIC PEDESTALLED BEAKERS

The originals of these (Cam.71-81) can be pre- or post-43 at Sheepen; the Cam. series does not necessarily cover all the possibilities, and native copies, as some here, do not slavishly imitate exact originals.

Notes

Cam. 76 was by far the commonest of the Gallo-Belgic pedestalled beakers at Sheepen, and 'not yet definitely paralleled abroad*. The date range was I-IV/VI (AD 10-60/65); one of these originals was buried in the Lexden mirror grave, Lexden group 1.

The Dartford pot is in a dark grey fabric with small grits, very well made, and unfortunately quite without context. It is similar to, e.g., Cam.78, and Cam. fig.49 no.6, both represented more completely abroad than at Colchester. The Crookhams pot is also very neatly made: cf. Gose (1975) no.308, from Trier and mid-1st century AD (not TR) and Cam. fig.49 no.9 for the general shape.
