Notes

The examples show the whole range of dates and contexts; it is fairly common in E Kent as well as the Herts, centres, and can appear from the end of the 1st century BC until the post-conquest period. The Great Wakering pot, from a grave with grog-tempered vessels, is in a Roman fabric; the Canterbury jar, while unaccompanied, is in the very hard local version of grog. The Sheepen pots show that the change to romanised fabrics happened very quickly there. The list does, however, give several good examples in contexts that are likely to be early (Swarling, Wheathampstead, Braughing). It does not spread far across the Chilterns.
