Notes

The Sheepen examples sum up the form well, and show the typological progression from rounded (218Aa) in thick native fabric, to angular, in romanised hard thin fabric (218Ac). It was very common at Sheepen, and many of the examples, from later levels, are standard in form and romanised in fabric, and this Ac shape appears frequently in Roman grey wares in the late 1st century AD. The other examples here show the preference for the rounder form in grog-tempered pots generally. The low sloping shoulder at Boxford is a local characteristic. B3-4 is a common form in Kent, but not in Herts.; some of the Kent examples are post-conquest.
