Notes

Common in the Herts.-Beds, region; see E3-7 for a special variant. Many of its contexts are either in unassociated graves or have been lost, but it seems to be a form popular for burials from the later 1st century BC, before imports became commonly available (Lexden has two rare imported jugs). The Flanders Weir pot is thin, hard, and possibly romanised.
