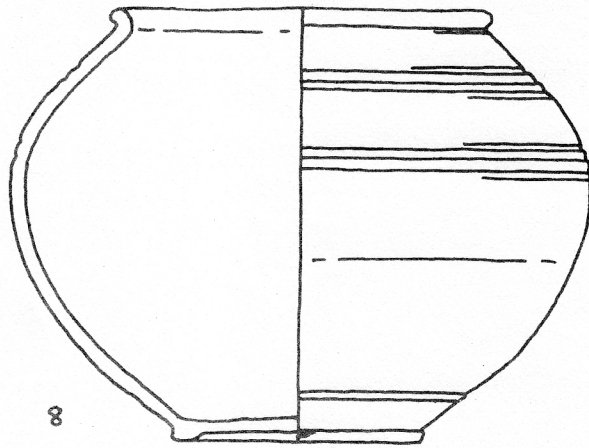
Notes

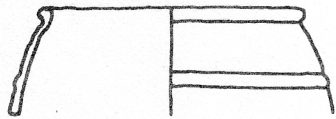


B5-5: grooved globular barrel jars.

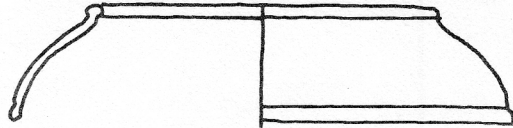




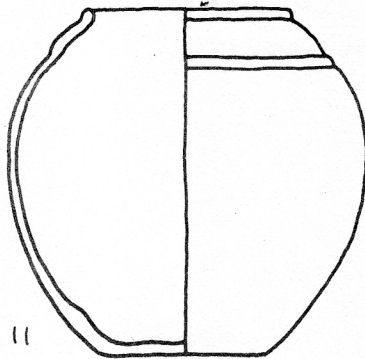
