Notes

None of these are at all early, and most are likely to be post-conquest. The Caldecotte specimen, from the occupation, not the kiln, was with mostly Roman material, and the Leighton Buzzard pot was reburied in a Saxon grave with a Roman platter copy.

The type is found in Roman fabrics in the later 1st century AD, and e.g. at Bromham, Beds., no.217: shell-tempered, 'below Flavian/Antonine seal'. The addition of a girth groove to the plain grog-tempered everted-rim bowl/jar/cup forms is consistently a post-conquest feature where ascertainable. It hardly occurs in Essex or Kent.
