

Notes

Not common in Kent, but widespread elsewhere. They are varied, as they can be related to several of the El forms, with still some emphasis on the carination; it is difficult to divide them usefully, and they are best kept together here to show the range of variation.



Note that:

the rounder carinations are typologically late, and found on some of the vessels that are likely to be mid-lst century AD (Sheepen, Cam.217; Prittlewell; Northampton).

the Kelvedon vessel seems to have been made with a template.

Sheepen Cam.209 was considered an early type, related to vessels from 1st century BC cemeteries in Kent: cf. E2-2. But there is only one example in the CM type trays, thin, grey grog with a red sandwich below buff inside and burnished dark grey outside. The fabric is not romanised, but it is not the thick soft native kind.

Ugley: this pot is inaccurate, and looks more natural a shape in the sketch in the CM Register, with a wider mouth. The pot itself has not been found; it was with an E3-3, a post-conquest form.
