ROUNDED WITH NO INTERNAL MOULDING

The two Aylesford pieces are not grog-tempered but are included here as any native versions of this form are rare (see below).

See G1-9. Cam. 16 was the most important Gallo-Belgic type at Chichester, which with Cam.58 and 56 'suggests an important phase of import after c. AD 65' (Rigby 1978, 199) and still in use on military sites C.A.D 70-85 (op.cit., 190; similar date at Braughing).

Copies are likely to be post-conquest. The two Aylesford vessels belong in this class because of their complete lack of internal offset or moulding, but they are anomalous and may not be copies of Cam. 16. They have no near parallels; they are made of the local greensand fabric.
