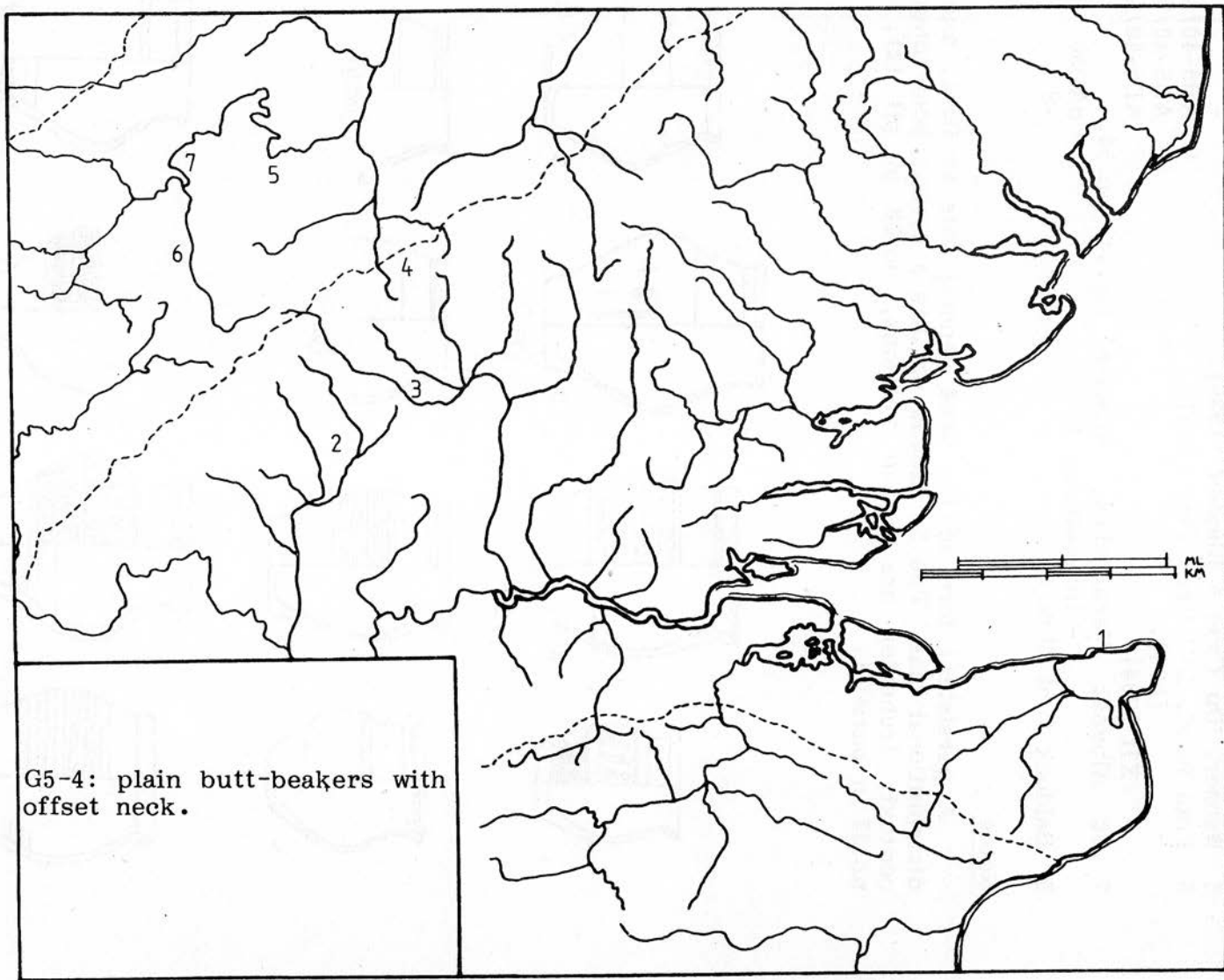

The Crookhams pot has 'hammered' marks, not decoration.

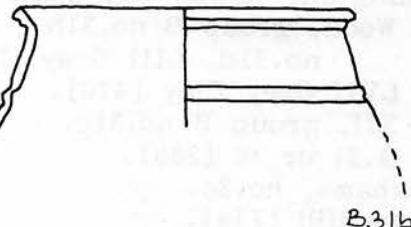
