Notes

Many of these look more elegant than they in fact are; these plain lids are often badly made and coarsely finished. The Cam.3 is the best looking but the Roman lid [960] appears so similar that it may be the same pot. The Winsley's Almshouses lid was distorted when it was made; the Swarling lid is a disgraceful specimen, roughly HM and untreated outside, and all the rest can be and are described as 'coarse'. The Hitchin pot was roughly wiped inside with a piece of cloth or a brush; the rim is not circular and it does not fit the bowl properly. Yet many of them were made to cover burial pots: the plain D3-3 form usually, not the cordoned D3-4 which commonly had the suitably elaborate and much better made L4 as its lid form.
