S6: GLOBULAR STORAGE VESSELS OF CONTINENTAL FORM

These are large with a flattened folded clay rim. One of the Sheepen examples was pierced with many thin holes to prevent warping of the thick rim during firing.

Notes

These are native and Roman at Sheepen, and hardly found elsewhere in the area of grog-tempering; cf. Haltern type 65 (Koepp et al. 1909, 248 & Abb.35 nos.3-4); Hofheim 68 & 78 (Ritterling 1913, 307, Abb.77); Gose (1975), nos.356-8 (Augustan to 3rd quarter of the 1st century AD). Cf. also Marsh's type 52 (Marsh 1978, 186 & fig.6.22), derived from the Rhineland and produced at Usk, but never common; and reappearing in the mica-dusted variety of early fine wares in the early 2nd century.
